Sagik In At Last

A reception to welcome Dr. Bernard P. Sagik, new Vice President of Academic Affairs, was held this past Tuesday in the Drexel Faculty Club. Invited to the reception were all the Department Heads, Deans of the Colleges, Administrators, and student representatives from the Triangle and Student Congress. Also present at the reception was a former Vice president of Academic Affairs, since retired from the position.

Dr. Sagik stood with Drexel's president, William W. Hagerty, as the various guests filed by to meet the new Vice-President. Dr. Hagerty personally introduced each person to Dr. Sagik, adding a description of the person's position - often in a humorous way.

Asking Dr. Sagik how he felt about being at Drexel, he replied, "I'm not quite sure yet...I feel very much at home somehow." Coming from the University of Texas at San Antonio, and originally a Mid-Westerner, Sagik observed that Easterners seemed to "live hotter and drink hotter." - though this observation was not restricted to the Drexel community Easterners.

Once the reception group had established itself, with the cocktails and hors d'oeuvres, Dr. Hagerty gave a short welcoming speech to Dr. Sagik.

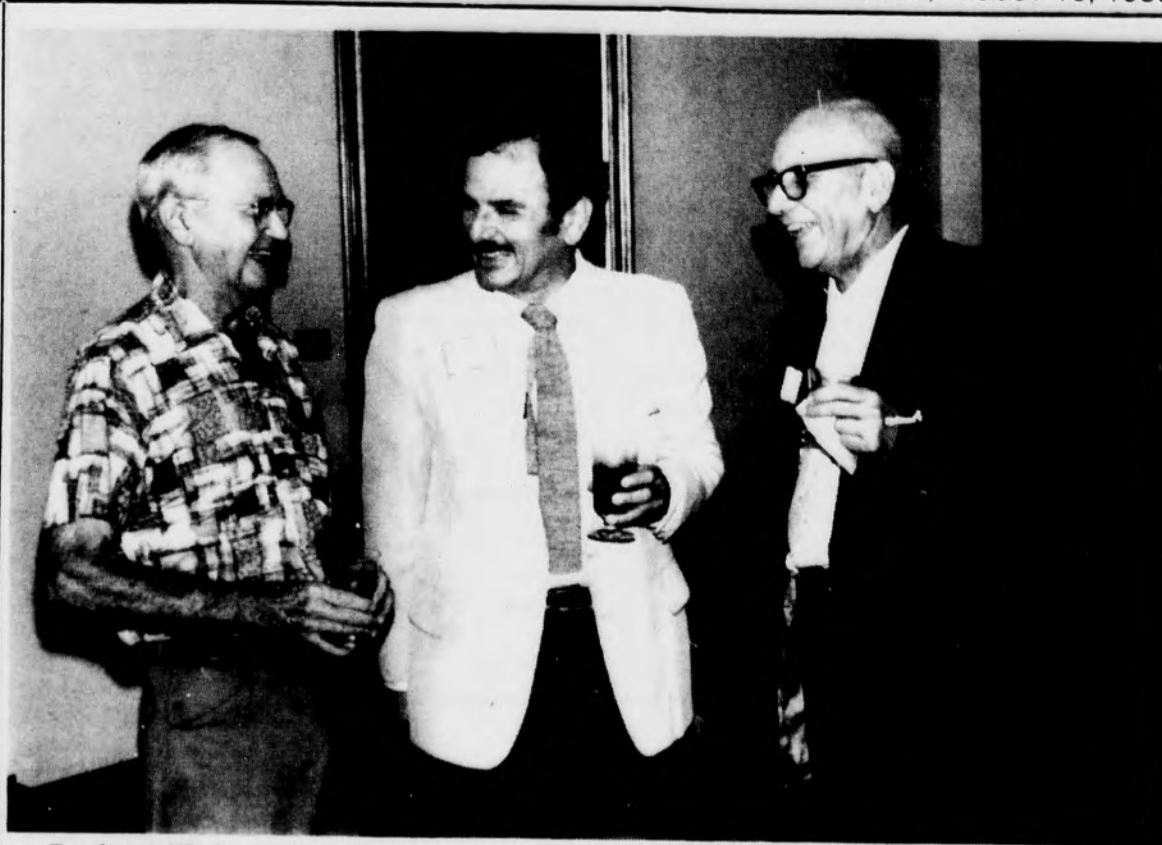
"Herb, (Mr. Raynes and former Vice-President of Academic Affairs) did a great job," said Hagerty. "...we're delighted to have (Dr. Sagik) here...to do the job that (Mr. Raynes) did." Added Hagerty, "it is easier to succeed at failure than at success," referring to Raynes' success in his former position.

After Dr. Hagerty spoke, Dr. Sagik made a short speech. Sagik essentially said that he will feel equivalent to a freshman for the next year. He noted that freshmen spend their first year going through an "educating and socializing" process, and that he "belongs in this category." He closed his speech by thanking in advance the people who in the coming year, will be his "educators."

As the reception continued, the Triangle was able to speak with Dr. Sagik personally for a short time.

"I liked Drexel from the first time I came up here," Sagik stated. He said that he has known of Drexel's reputation for quite some time, especially the cooperative education program, which he feels is "very powerful."

Sagik holds a Ph.D. in bacteriology and biochemistry from the University of Illinois. Aside from almost constant contact with the academic world, he also spent twelve years in Industry. "I've been involved with administrative (affairs) on and off," he added.

Sagik believes that engineers and scientists are "trained to be problem solvers." Hence, although he may not now be involved with a specific scientific problem in his new position, he will still be looking for "pragmatic solutions" to problems.

"Problem solving is the name of the game," Sagik emphasized, "and I enjoy working with people." He feels that universities and colleges are "the last place...where people can explore ideas." Concluded Dr. Sagik, "I think that (the idea of exploration in universities) is very important."

Congress encouraged

Two guests from the Office of Student Affairs were present at the last Student Congress meeting for the term, held this past Tuesday night. Dean Hopewell, Associate Dean of Students, and Cindy McCartney, Student Services Counselor, spoke to the Congress about matters dealing mainly with student participation in activities and student programming.

Dean Hopewell emphasized the motivation aspect of student participation. In order to attract students to a committee or organization, he said, a "clear purpose" is needed to show students that the organization means business. According to Hopewell, students (and people in general) are more likely to become involved when they can "see the structure" of the thing that they are getting involved in. Also, on a psychological level, he added that when students are motivated to join a group, it is best to have them begin working on small tasks, and then gradually undertake larger ones.

Specifically for Student Congress, Dean Hopewell emphasized a "work mentality". By this, Hopewell means that the Congress should think about their tasks and responsibilities not just when they meet, but also "away from meetings".

Cindy McCartney, Student Services Counselor, spoke about the restructuring of the Student Program Board (SPB). Currently, plans are to have SPB as it stands totally renovated into a new, more efficient organization. "There has been a vacuum in student programming," said Ms. McCartney, and it is hoped that redefining and re-writing the goals of a social programming organization will ensure its success in programming successfully for Drexel students.

According to Ms. McCartney, the outline for the new "council on social programming" contains seven basic areas of focus: cultural arts; film; major events; recreation and travel; social functions; publicity; and special programs. Tying these different areas together will be the institution of a centralized social

calendar, announcing events at Drexel on a monthly basis. The social calendar would also include fraternity happenings, and other social information pertinent to Drexel students.

Other business at the meeting included further discussion on the closing of 32d st., the suggestion that lights be put up around the Armory, and further input on the forthcoming teacher evaluations.

Chuck McGonigle, President of the Student Body, elaborated further on the coming goals of Congress for this next year. The next Congress meeting is tentatively scheduled for the second Tuesday of Fall term.

Financial Aid Gets New Boss

Beginning on August 1, 1980, Nicholas Flocca became director of Financial Aid. Mr. Flocca is filling a position left vacant by the sudden resignation of Frank McKeogh earlier this year.

Flocca has been working with Temple University's Financial Aid office since September 1971 when he assumed the position of Assistant Director of Financial Aid. On April 1, 1973 he became an Associate Director of Financial Aid. He left Temple University as the Director of

Financial Aid. Flocca sees his position as "basically the same except that Temple is a state related school and Drexel is a private school."

At Temple Flocca served on numerous committees including the Sex discrimination Committee, Student Employment Committee, Student Systems Committee, Committee for the Handicapped, and the University Scholarship Committee.

"It will take three or four weeks to review everything and get started...you just have to learn the new system" explained Flocca.

Research Awards

Three faculty members have received Drexel University's fourth annual Research Scholar Awards to aid their research.

Dr. Anthony W. Addison, Dr. Marilyn F. Bishop and Dr. Margot P. Cleary each received research funds, a full-time graduate assistant and release time from teaching responsibilities to conduct their respective research.

Dr. Addison, associate professor of chemistry, is investigating how iron and proteins interact in the human body.

Dr. Bishop, assistant professor of physics, is researching the basic interactions of electrons in metals.

Dr. Cleary, assistant professor of nutrition and food sciences, is studying obesity in rats.

"The purpose of the award is to stimulate university research by assisting faculty to develop new ideas and to venture into new areas of research activity," according to Dr. Kenneth N. Geller, director of Drexel's Center for Multidisciplinary Study and Research.

The College of Humanities and Social Science is now offering a new program for those wishing to take a foreign language but don't have time to attend classes during the day. Beginning with the fall term, the following language courses will be offered on a self-instructional basis.

Chinese R421 - first term of first year Chinese

Chinese R422 - second term of first year Chinese

French R455 - second term of second-year French (French V)

German R415 - second term of second-year German (German V)

Italian R493 - third term of first-year Italian (Italian III)

Russian R431 - first term of first-year Russian

Russian R432 - second term of first-year Russian

Spanish R474 - First term of second-year Spanish (Spanish IV)

Each course will be the usual four credits, and students can enroll using conventional enrollment procedures.

The course load will be approximately 10 hours a week of independent drill with programming cassette tapes and at least two hours a week of oral drill and conversation with a tutor who is a native speaker of the language.

Credit for the class depends on successful completion of a two hour examination administered by a professor of the specific language.

A Murder is Announced on Friday, August the 13th in the Local Gazette. And from there, the action of this Agatha Christie suspense thriller proceeds.

The Hedgerow Theatre in Moylan, PA, is an old gristmill in a secluded, woodsy environment which sets an appropriate stage for this play - in a remodelled Victorian house in Chipping, Cleghorn during the Agatha Christie era.

The anxiety arises in the Paddock Barn on Friday morning with the arrival of the Gazette announcing a murder to take place 6:30 p.m. at "that very residence." The question of the housedwellers, "Is this a joke, or worse yet, could I be the intended victim?" is soon answered when the electrical power is cut off, gunshots are fired, and a man dies on the living room floor.

For the entire weekend, everyone with the possible exception of the witty Miss Marple, is confused by the complexity of this mystery.

In Act II, the puzzle pieces begin to interlock. With Miss Marple assisting Inspector Craddock, (or rather Inspector Craddock assisting Miss Marple), each question is answered, thus another piece fits together. Then finally on Monday evening, the picture is completed and we find out "who is really who."

All in all, the Hedgerow Theatre provides an entertaining evening in a refreshing suburban atmosphere. **A Murder is Announced** is performed every Thurs., Fri., & Sat through Sept. 20 at 8:30. Tickets are \$3,\$4,\$5 for students depending on the night. For info & reservations call 565-4855.

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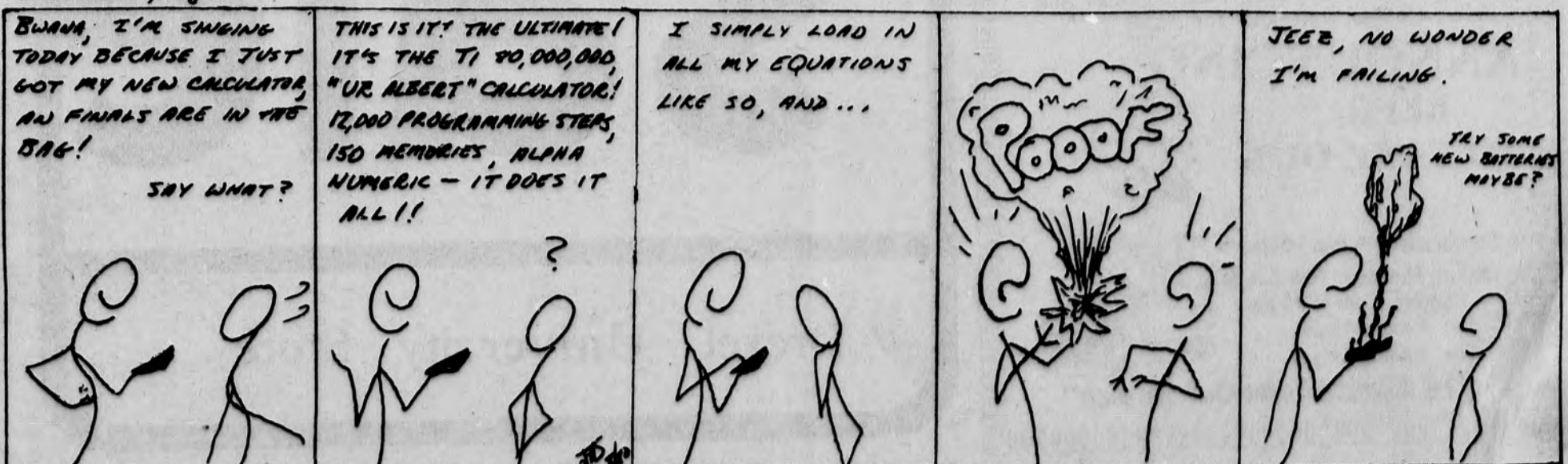
