The Student Program Association, first-time sponsors of the annual Commencement festivities, announced earlier this week their cancellation of the program due to poor ticket sales.

On March 26, at approximately 08:37:52, the Drexel University Monumental Building (DUMB) Association annouced their now re jected plans for their version of the new residence hall.

During the presentation, a model of the proposed 2 story dormitory was unveiled while senior engineer, Frank

Several students, who were present at the presentation, questioned why the building plans had slipped behind schedule. 

Computers pose safety hazard

The recent influx of personal computer on campuses across the nation has led to a marked increase in the frequency of computer crimes at colleges and universities, according to Snevil Flunk, deputy assistant secretary of the American Colegiate Security Alliance. At a recent meeting of ACSA in Minsk, USSR, Flunk announced that such incidences occurred 25% more often in 1984 than in the year previous,

"The prevalence of personal computer around campus has made it dangerous to walk around alone after dark," claims University of California-Redondo Beach junior Clas DeBrinski. "I mean, they gang up and harrass you if you don't know at least

two programming languages."

Parke Davis, director of security at Augwash College in either North of South Carolina, agrees. "Computer crime is definitely getting out of con-trol. As the number of computers goes up, so does the brazenness of their offences.

Davis cites a number of incidents in which personal computer were implicated this past year, ranging from suspiciously shuffled term papers to a murdeous assault on the electronics of a 1985 Cadillac. "What we have," claims Davis, "is clear indications of hitter foul engine all free stending a bitter feud against all free-standing microchips. Even pocket calculators aren't safe from these marauders." Sill, muses Gerry "Iron Arm" Fit-

simmons, conditions have been worse Fitsimmons, a security guard at Ed's Institute of Technology, just outside Kidney's Point, Oklahoma, can remember when the first mainframe computers were installed. "After the computer room swere shut down," he reminisces, "the terminals would get together in the quad and jump students. The kids would get the stuf-fing knocked out of them if they didn't know the password." Ed's security guards finally tamed the errant ter-minals, and things have been fairly quiet ever since

But as more and more students bring personal computer to school, will this necessarily lead to ever-worsening computer crime on America's cam puses? Experts don't think so. Eric (last name unkown), chairman of the Committee to Investigate the Likelihood of Ever-Worsening Computer Crime on American Campuses, says, "I don't think it's very likely. I've investigated the matter thoroughly, and have reached to conclusion that the likelihood is not very

Still, while rogue personal computers have not yeat overrun the na-tion, studetns at many college sare bewarned about wandering alone after dark if they are unfamiliar with using stubborn PC's. "Augwash has asked all students to avoid the more isolated spots around campus when it's dark, unless they carry a system disk floppy with them," Davis revealed. "It's an experimental program, but it seems to be working."



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

Dragons take Penn in gridiron classic

They have accomplished the impossible. There hasn't been anything like it since the 1980 Phillies won it all. The celebrating continued long into the night and is still going. Drexel's football team is the cause of all the celebration as they broke Penn's three-year stronghold on the Ivy League title and wrestled the crown away from the Quakers with a stunn-ing 41-7 victory. tathertz scored on a 16-yard run, and the rout was on.

With the Drexel throng in the stand shouting "Penn is a bunch of sissies! The Dragons finished off the 41-7 demolition as Young kicked a 33-yard field goal and Kaholic scored the



University decides on dorm design

Final plans have been made and construction is ready to begin on the university's fifth dormitory, tentatively call MacHall, to be built on the corner of 34th and Arch Streets. Administration officials are hopeful that the dormitory will be completed in time to place students there by Fall term, 1986.

When the intention of building a 17-story building was first announced last year, members of various Powelton Village civic groups -- wanting to keep Powelton Village looking exactly as it does now in order to preserve its deep sense of history complained that such an edifice

would ruin the neighborhood. Since then, Drexel has worked closely with the groups granting them several concessions about the new Drexel dorm in return for the groups dropping a number of morals charge

against security director, Ed Smith.

The revised plans call for the dormitory to be fifteen stories tall, with an outside facade to make it look exactly like a Victorian house. Says ar-

construction,

chitect Murry Overhind, "From the outside, the building is a precise duplicate of several houses now found along Baring or Hamilton -- only much, much larger." Each of the fifteen floors will pro-

vide room enough for four students and their computers. Bathrooms, laundry facilities, and vending machines will be conveniently located next door in Calhoun Hall. In the basement are planned a cafeteria, a bar and lounges a portrait gallery, and a reservation-only brothel.

To help alleviate the parking pro-blem that will be made worse by this new construction, Drexel intends to build a vast subterranean garage area, covering approximately ten square city blocks and providing space for well

over one hundred compact cars.

To save money, the Civil Engineering department will be contracted out to design and implement the garage. Interested volunteers may contact the Civil Engineering department at x-2347, and ask for Spanky. When asked to commment on the
