



## Apathy, lack of alcohol cited in Commencement cancellation

The Student Program Association, first-time sponsors of the annual Commencement festivities, announced earlier this week their cancellation of the program due to poor ticket sales.

The cancellation of the event, which was to be held for the first time in the University's Physical Education Center, has been met with mixed reaction from members of the University community. While graduating seniors are up-in-arms with the decision, Director of Men's Physical Education and Athletics John Semanik was pleased with the move. "It's bad enough we had to have the Inauguration for President Gaither in the Gym in the first place. The only good thing about that is that me and Mary get to take home all of the pretty plants after the ceremony."

SPA president Sam "Hoyley" Quicksilver expressed his discontent

with the attitude of the student body, stating, "No matter what we try, we just don't get support from the goym."

When questioned about the events surrounding SPA's decision, Dean Snyder commented, "You have to understand, I'm not actually a dean. That's my first name. So actually, I'm not really qualified to say." Snyder

## Hagerty wants old job back

In a suprise move yesterday, former University President William W. Hagerty announced to the Board of Trustees that he would like his old job back.

Hagerty explained his move at a press conference held at the Chisilhurst, NJ Country Club. "I have become very bored of retired life and look forward to returning to the duties that have always provided such a challenge to me. Actually, I like working at Drexel because I can sleep during the day and feel the excitement of knowing that I am getting away with something. That thrill just isn't there when you are retired."

Hagerty was the President of Drexel for the past 20 years, and was succeeded last year by the current president, William Gaither.

I am totally against Hagerty being reinstated as the President of Drexel. I think that Gaither is the best choice we could have come up with, given the constraints we had to work under."

## University decides on dorm design

Final plans have been made and construction is ready to begin on the university's fifth dormitory, tentatively call MacHall, to be built on the corner of 34th and Arch Streets. Administration officials are hopeful that the dormitory will be completed in time to place students there by Fall tem, 1986.

When the intention of building a 17-story building was first announced last year, members of various Powelton Village civic groups — wanting to keep Powelton Village looking exactly as it does now in order to preserve its deep sense of history — complained that such an edifice would ruin the neighborhood.

Since then, Drexel has worked closely with the groups granting them several concessions about the new Drexel dorm in return for the groups dropping a number of morals charges against security director, Ed Smith.

The revised plans call for the dormitory to be fifteen stories tall, with an outside facade to make it look exactly like a Victorian house. Says ar-

chitect Murry Overhind, "From the outside, the building is a precise duplicate of several houses now found along Baring or Hamilton — only much, much larger."

Each of the fifteen floors will provide room enough for four students and their computers. Bathrooms, laundry facilities, and vending machines will be conveniently located next door in Calhoun Hall. In the basement are planned a cafeteria, a bar and lounges, a portrait gallery, and a reservation-only brothel.

To help alleviate the parking problem that will be made worse by this new construction, Drexel intends to build a vast subterranean garage area, covering approximately ten square city blocks and providing space for well over one hundred compact cars.

To save money, the Civil Engineering department will be contracted out to design and implement the garage. Interested volunteers may contact the Civil Engineering department at X2347, and ask for Spanky. When asked to comment on the

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## Designer displays rejected dorm design

On March 26, at approximately 08:37:52, the Drexel University Monumental Building (DUMB) Association announced their now rejected plans for their version of the new residence hall.

During the presentation, a model of the proposed 2 story dormitory was unveiled while senior engineer, Frank "The Wowser Watcher" Young, greeted the press.

The University spent 4 months and Gamma Sigma Sigma's total budget investigating the now rejected structure.

According to Harry, the Macalister Hall guard, only the most modern and sophisticated orange building materials would have been used to build the new dorm.

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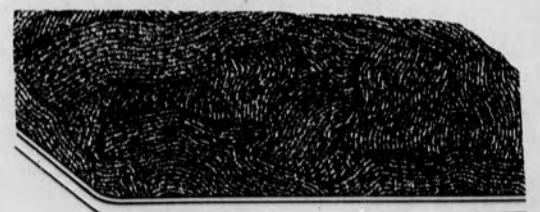

**Triangle:** Afraid of exposure, Dr. Sagik?

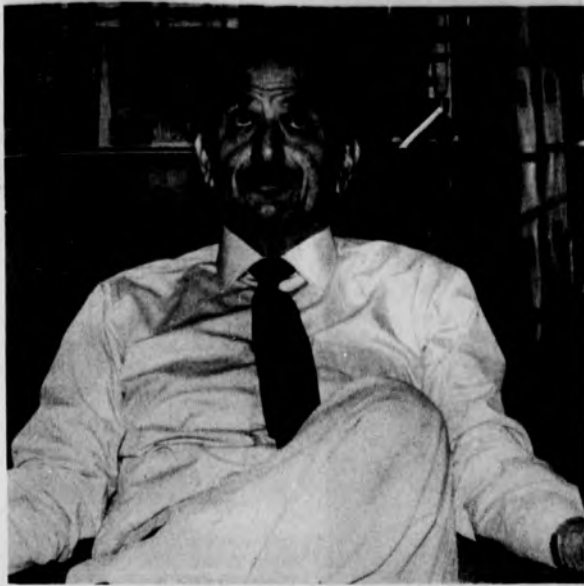

## Computers pose safety hazard

The recent influx of personal computer on campuses across the nation has led to a marked increase in the frequency of computer crimes at colleges and universities, according to Snevil Flunk, deputy assistant secretary of the American Collegiate Security Alliance. At a recent meeting of ACSA in Minsk, USSR, Flunk announced that such incidences occurred 25% more often in 1984 than in the year previous, 1983.

"The prevalence of personal computer around campus has made it dangerous to walk around alone after dark," claims University of California-Redondo Beach junior Clas DeBrinski. "I mean, they gang up and harrass you if you don't know at least two programming languages."

Parke Davis, director of security at Augwash College in either North of South Carolina, agrees. "Computer crime is definitely getting out of control. As the number of computers goes up, so does the brazenness of their offences."

Davis cites a number of incidents in which personal computer were implicated this past year, ranging from suspiciously shuffled term papers to a murderous assault on the electronics of a 1985 Cadillac. "What we have," claims Davis, "is clear indications of a bitter feud against all free-standing microchips. Even pocket calculators aren't safe from these marauders."

Sill, muses Gerry "Iron Arm" Fittsimmons, conditions have been worse. Fittsimmons, a security guard at Ed's Institute of Technology, just outside Kidney's Point, Oklahoma, can remember when the first mainframe computers were installed. "After the computer room swere shut down," he reminisces, "the terminals would get together in the quad and jump students. The kids would get the stuffing knocked out of them if they didn't know the password." Ed's security guards finally tamed the errant terminals, and things have been fairly quiet ever since.

But as more and more students bring personal computer to school, will this necessarily lead to ever-worsening computer crime on America's campuses? Experts don't think so. Eric (last name unknown), chairman of the Committee to Investigate the Likelihood of Ever-Worsening Computer Crime on American Campuses, says, "I don't think it's very likely. I've investigated the matter thoroughly, and have reached to conclusion that the likelihood is not very great."

Still, while rogue personal computers have not yeat overrun the nation, studetns at many college sare being warned about wandering alone after dark if they are unfamiliar with using stubborn PC's. "Augwash has asked all students to avoid the more isolated spots around campus when it's dark, unless they carry a system disk floppy with them," Davis revealed. "It's an experimental program, but it seems to be working."

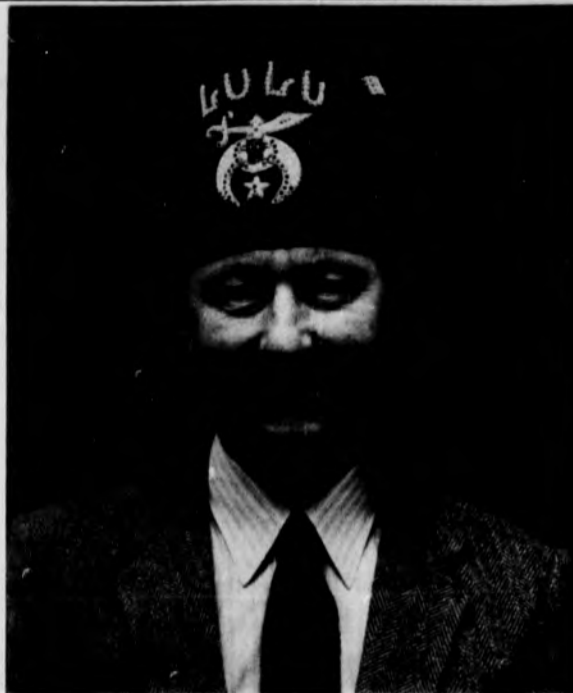

## Eating at the cafeteria

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## SCARFACE: DREXEL PLAYERS TO PERFORM CLASSIC

Drexel University's Department of Performing Arts, in its attempt to appeal to a more varied audience, is scrapping its plans for a production of "Guys and Dolls" and is currently rehearsing for its spring production of the classic gangster story "Scarface." After careful scrutinizing of both the original 1933 movie screenplay starring Paul Muni, George Raft, and Boris Karloff, and the exhilarating and provocative 1983 version starring Al Pacino, Director of Drexel Players, Adelle Rubin, decided that the most recent screen portrayal of a ruthless, revengeful, cocaine dealing, scumbucket would be most attractive to the average Drexel student. 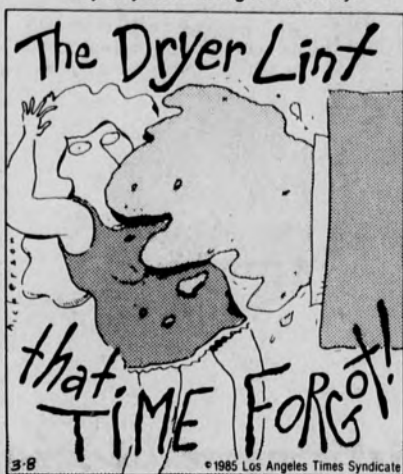

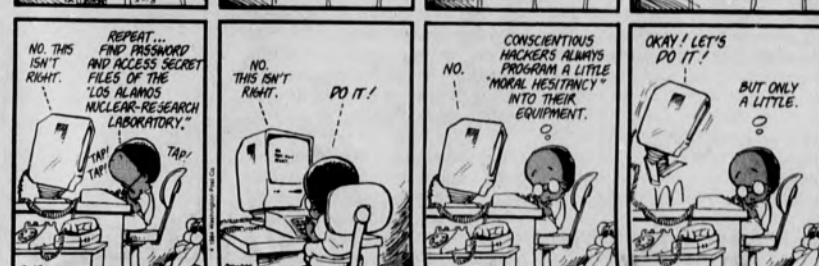

## Sports events for us all

During the next week, Drexel will be hosting what has been up until now, a mostly unknown event. ## Dragons take Penn in gridiron classic

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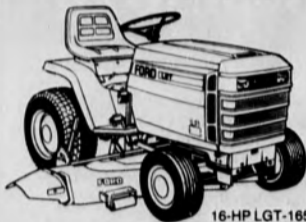
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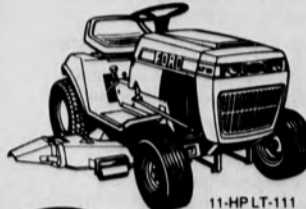

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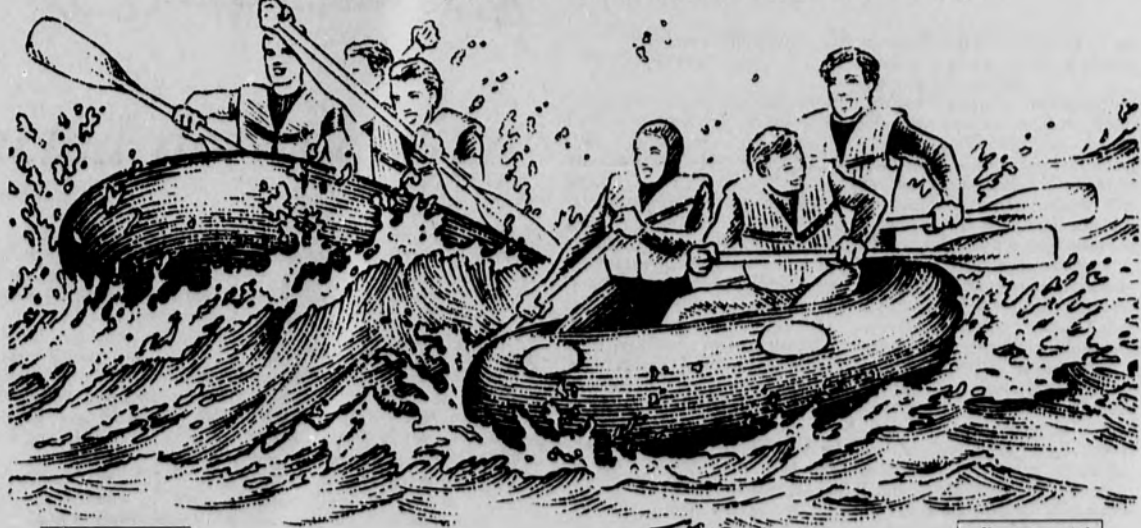


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## Apathy, lack of alcohol cited in Commencement cancellation
