## Bell Atlantic may wire dormitories

Drexel's determination to wire the dorms for cable and computer network access has brought Bell Atlantic into the bidding competition with Wade Cablevision, who had exclusive rights to wire West Philadelphia for cable television until a cable deregulation bill passed a few months ago.

Bell's main competition is Wade Cablevision, which almost had the job wrapped up last month.

Both companies plan to offer proposals to get the job of linking the dormitories to a campus computer network and to cable television. Bell Atlantic is proposing to lower Drexel's costs by using its own transmission lines, including their satellites.

"Bell is now able to bring the desired services into Drexel without satellites and other expensive front equipment that [the University] would have to purchase," said Jim Graham, the director of purchasing. Bell's additional ability to include phone service into the wiring may give them the edge against Wade. "The fact that Bell and Wade are competing will provide a better opportunity for a good deal," said Graham. [Graham is also financial advisor to The Triangle.]

The plan will include two jacks in all of the rooms in the four dorms that are being used


by students. The jacks will be capable of linking computers to a campus network, T.V.'s to cable reception, and phones to fiber-optic service.

The dorm wiring "essentially completes a campus network," said Dr. John Gregory who will head the committee in charge of the operation. The Drexel TV station will play a major role on the new cable television. Video links will be present around campus and things like lectures could be taped and viewed by residents in their rooms. Students living in the dorms will be able to use their computer to hook up with terminals in places such as the Korman Center, the library, and with personal computers of friends who have them in the dorms.

It is hoped that the price to students will be up front and include all three capabilities. The cost, according to Graham, will be no more, if not less, than what students would have to normally pay for phone and cable service and will include the network features at no additional cost.

The University has set a deadline of September 3 for the competing companies to enter their bids and will make a decision on which to go with shortly thereafter. The plan is to have the job underway by the end of the fall semester and to have at least some sections completed by the first day of winter term.

# Condition of library major topic at August Fireside Chat

On Wednesday, August 18, a Fireside Chat (minus the fire) was held at the Creese Student Union between representatives of the University, student government and students.

The main topic of discussion was the W. W. Hagerty library.

Eileen Hitchingham, dean of the library, and Joy Collins, head of information services, answered most of the questions concerning the library.

One of the main student concerns was the cutback this spring in the library hours. When asked about the changes, Hitchingham blamed budget cutbacks and said that she plans to adjust the hours according to peak library use. The reduced hours will not be changed, according to Hitchingham, but it is possible that the library may open later in the morning and close later at night to fit student needs.

Hitchingham mentioned some alternate study sites on campus that could be kept open late nights by the university because they are cheaper. "The Creese Student [Union] may be open 24 hours," she said.

Engineering representative Lisa Mahle of the USGA inquired about the lack of new volumes in the library. Hitchingham responded that the budget allotment for new books (\$130,000 a year —

books average \$50 each), is hardly enough to fulfill all needs.

Hitchingham stated that any book, however, can be obtained by Drexel's library. from other libraries through interlibrary loans. For students to do this, they must place a request at least a week in advance for the desired book. "We basically can get anything in the world," Hitchingham said.

Collins and Hitchingham both hoped more students would take advantage of the availability of E-mail accounts and the Dragnet computer system.

When asked about the carpet problems in the library, Hitchingham said that the floor will be totally renewed. The process, which will be done in October, includes a complete tiling of the basement and new carpeting on the other three floors of the library

## Drexel brings marketer to help make University more appealing

Marketing expert Joseph G. McDonough has been selected by Drexel to create and operate a new marketing plan for the university to make it more appealing and more well known to men and women across the United States.

McDonough was chosen after a nationwide search and will assume the position of the vice president of marketing.

"I am excited and wholeheartedly endorse the Drexel approach [to education]," said McDonough.

Drexel hopes the creation of

a marketing post could give them an advantage since the majority of universities depend on marketing firms to handle advertising and public relation.

McDonough plans to expand marketing initiatives to strategically target the increased number of graduating seniors in the latter half of the 1990s.

At last week's fireside chat, McDonough said, "We are working with a major licensing firm to enable us to get Drexel merchandise out into the stores." It is currently only available in the school bookstore.

McDonough's past experience includes successfully leading the \$75 million dollar turnaround of Dentyne chewing gum and the national launch of "Cinn'A'Burst" chewing gum in 1991. He is leaving his position at Warner-Lambert Co. to take the Drexel position.

McDonough is from Claymont, Delaware and earned a bachelor's degree in communication from the University of Delaware before getting his master's degree at Fordham.

## Hsu 'in good standing' with probation dept.

Although a trial is not expected to begin for at least a few years, lawyers for both sides are busy in a process of discovery. The civil suit brought by Tracey Dutton against Michael Hsu, Drexel, Delta Sigma Phi, and three unnamed students, resulted from an April 1991 alleged sexual assault at the Delta Sigma Phi fraternity house.

Hsu received 18 months probation after being convicted of indecent assault, criminal conspiracy, and simple assualt. Hsu's probation officer, Cheryl Barham, commented that there was some misunderstaning surrounding Hsu's case. She said that his lawyers had misin-

formed him as to the probation requirements.

"Things were mixed up for about a month ... but [Hsu] is in good standing with the probation department," explained Barham. Lawyers for both the plaintiff

#### Former DU football coach, AD dies

Former Drexel athletic director, Maury H. McMaines, died Tuesday, August 17, at the age of 90 in Brandenton, Florida.

McMains contributed to university athletics for more than 40 years. Starting out as an assistant football coach, he advanced to head football coach before becoming director of athletics.

McMains became involved in athletics in 1914 when he quarterbacked his high school football team in Des Moines, Iowa, as a freshman. After being selected all-state twice he joined the Marines in World War I and later quarterbacked the Marine foot-

McMains also had side jobs writing for the Philadelphia Inquirer and the Baltimore Sun.

He is survived by his wife, Eve and several nieces and nephews.

ment on any specifics of the case. Civil cases, unlike criminal cases, do not require disclosure. That is, the plaintiff is not required to disclose informa-

tion to the defendants and vice versa. An attorney commented that premature disclosure of specific information could damage the case. settled out of court. The process of

discovery involves investigating charges made by the plaintiff and preparing for trial.

Becuase of a case backlog in the Philadelphia court system, Michael Cataldo, attorney for Dutton, speculated that the case would not go to trial for three years if it was not settled out of court.

Drexel University Judicial Officer Dianna Dale declined to release any information

> from a judicial trial that resulted from the April 1991 alleged sexual assault. However, Hsu commented that he was sanctioned for disorderly conduct. Dale ex-

plained that specific information about any judicial hearings are confidential. At least one attorney involved in the case plans to subpeona these records for the trial.

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
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## It's Caveat Emptor for off-campus housing renters

While off-campus housing may offer students more freedom and independence than living in dorms, rental agreements for apartments or houses are fraught with legal landmines, housing

officials and attorneys warn.

The initial adrenalin rush when students rent their first apartments can dissipate quickly when plumbing falls apart, deposits are withheld or a roommate abruptly departs, leaving other renters in the lurch.

College officials say moving into off-campus housing, especially during the junior and senior years, has almost become a rite of passage. But many students don't know what questions to ask landlords and can end up with much larger headaches than having finals and papers due at the same time.

"The first time students rent they aren't savvy consumers," said Mark Karon, an attorney with student legal services at the University of Minnesota. "They're excited. They're away from home. Mom and Dad aren't there. This is great. Nobody is going to be here to tell them when to go to bed or anything else. But they don't consider the property or location. They may not look at what else is going on with the landlord."

Karon, who is president of the National Legal Aid and Defense Lawyers Association, Student Legal Services Section, said about 343 college and universities have some form of student legal services on campus. When students get caught in a problem with a landlord or a roommate, they can get free representation and try to solve the problem through negotiation or arbitration

He said the majority of cases that his office deals with are landlord-tenant issues. "The biggest reason is that students are transients who are targeted by landlords," Karon said. "At the end of the school year they keep someone's deposit. And students aren't going to take the time necessary to make claims."

Roane Akchurin, manager of the community housing office at the University of California-Santa Barbara, said her office mediated about 600 cases last year between students and landlords, and about 40 percent of those cases involved deposit disputes.

Officials found that landlords were holding deposits due to claims of damage — real or not — to apartments and houses in Isla Vista, a one-square-mile neighborhood that borders the university and is home to about 8,000 UCSB students.

About three years ago Akchurin's office began a free videotaping service so students could videotape the condition of their apartment before they moved in. "It's been real helpful. It's a proactive kind of thing to decrease problems," she said. "It holds both parties accountable. It's been a tough sell, but it's catching on."

Of UCSB's 18,000 students, about 5,000 live on campus. The remainder either live on their own or with parents or relatives, she said.

Thorny issues that off-campus roommates face include cleanliness and overnight guests,

Akchurin said. A majority of problems occur when one roommate takes off and leaves the other roommates in a financial and legal bind, she said.

Her office attempts to get the roommates to settle the issue among themselves. If that doesn't work, campus officials will try to get all the students together to negotiate and avoid small claims court. "We try to avoid legal actions. Probably 35 percent of the students handle it themselves, and probably 40 percent go through mediation," she said. "But sometimes it does end up in court."

One problem is the fact that many students are transient and many of the building owners are absentee landlords, officials said. Neighborhoods around many campuses don't tend to house permanent residents, and landlords may not be willing to put money into the buildings because of the high turnover

"Older homes near campus are a lot of work. Property values drop. Single families don't want to buy these things," said Patt VanDyke, director of the Talent Development Center at Northwest Missouri State University in Marvyille. "There's a lot of money to be made by people

who have no interest in the community. We have the usual number of slumlords. The area near the college is full of old homes cut into three or four apartments."

Northwest Missouri provides computers in dormitory rooms and other services to create incentives to stay on campus, VanDyke said. But many students want to move off campus for various reasons.

"Many of them are over the partying frenzy. They have established their freedom and don't have to prove anything," VanDyke said. "They may have a significant other in their lives. That's their business. They're grownups. They want more privacy. They believe they can pool their resources on certain things and eat when they want to. It's part of the maturation process in moving from the campus community, and having activities taken care of for you, to managing on your own.'

Unlike other campuses, Northwestern Missouri offers no legal aid to students. However, there are lawyers who teach on campus, and students have contacted them when a dispute occurs.

Several faculty members wrote a guide for students on

what to watch out for titled "Tips for the Wary Renter."

The suggestions include:

 Read lease agreements carefully. Before you sign a contract, read every detail.

• Investigate. Before signing anything, make an effort to find out the best landlords by talking with people you trust.

• Find out what's wrong. Compile a list of pre-existing damages (cracked light fixtures, walls, outlets that don't work etc.) so you won't be charged later.

"Be highly suspicious of a guy having to promise to fix things. Things should be in good order when they first move in. We have seen some incredible things like a landlord who ran a gas line on the outside of a house," she said. "We've had students see a room and be told not to plug so many things into this outlet. That's a fire hazard. When you're 19 or 20 you think you're going to live forever, so it doesn't matter to them. This invulnerability is a problem."

Some housing officials also suggest students obtain rental insurance for loss, but find out first whether thefts or damages would be covered by their parents' insurance policies.

The community housing

office at UCSB publishes a 77page tenant's handbook for students who are considering living off campus. Included are lists of responsibilities both for tenants and landlords, suggested remedies for disputes both with landlords and roommates, and safety issues.

Karon, at the University of Michigan, said word of mouth is valuable when looking at property. "Try to find out if the landlord is reputable. Talk to someone who lives in the building," he said. "Landlords can be fast talkers and students will accept what they say."

He suggested that students look at the apartment they are going to rent and not just the model, and check such items as window coverings, paint condition, bathrooms, the kitchen and electrical outlets and appliances.

Additionally, if students don't understand terms of the contract, they should have an attorney review it. Once signed, the terms of the lease are binding.

"Students are somewhat ignorant of their rights. They are away from their parents for the first time to stake some sort of claim," Karon said. "Each state is different in landlord-tenant laws. They are exposed to it for the first time."

### Pa. college turns to bingo, babystting to fund athletics

When officials at Mansfield University of Pennsylvania scrambled a few years ago to find funds for the athletic department, they came up with two tried-and-true ideas: bingo and babysitting.

Now chartered buses regularly roll into the tiny town of Mansfield packed with hundreds of bingo affectionados, each in hopes of winning the big payout in the four-hour game held each week in the gym.

Some journey from as far as Philadelphia or Rochester, N.Y., to Mansfield, which is in north-central Pennsylvania.

"These are hard-core bingo players," observed Scott Miller, a spokesman for the 3,000-student university. "They're on the bingo circuit, and they're a colorful bunch. They bring their lucky pieces, only sit in certain places."

The bingo program is the largest athletic fundraiser for the university and has quadrupled the athletic scholarship fund in just three years with 150 athletes in 12 varsity sports receiving partial scholarships from the fund.

"Bingo is one of the most popular social events in the local area, and it was a natural evolution to use it as a fundraiser," said Steven McCloskey, sports information director.

The operation is run by volunteers from the athletic department who set up tables and chairs, distribute cards, call numbers, serve lunches and tear down when the game is over.

"It's pretty labor intensive," said Miller, noting that students rarely participate in the game, in which folks plunk down \$25 to join.

The bingo enterprise usually grosses as much as \$7,000 per

month, said Miller, and one month grossed a record \$10,000. Big winners can walk away with \$1,000, but the usual wins are \$300 to \$400.

The idea was conceived four years ago by two Mansfield coaches who said to themselves, "'If bingo works for churches, why can't it work for us?" said Miller.

In addition, there's "Kids Night Out," another fund-raising brainstorm that brings hundreds of local kids — and hundreds of dollars — to the gym every other Saturday night where they schmooze and play games with members of the Mansfield baseball team.

"Remember, these are the local heroes," reminded Miller.

The glorified babysitting operation, which is open six months out of the year, makes so much money that it funds the baseball team's annual spring training trip to the South.

"We have the best baseball

team in the state," said Miller.
"And one of the reasons is that
they can go south and play
against some of the better
teams."

The parents are so enthusiastic about the program that it made over \$20,000 last year, reported Miller, noting that the gym is teeming with children on the Saturday nights before the holidays.

"The kids don't have much else to do in Mansfield except at the college," he added.

#### institutes hotline to report hazing Jeorgia

Ron Binder is about the last person a party-hearty University of Georgia fraternity brother wants to see standing on the front steps of the fraternity house at three in the morning.

Nightmare City.

For bleary-eyed fraternity men, the appearance of the hastily-dressed Binder can only mean one thing: Somebody called the Hazing Hotline.

Binder, the university's adviser to fraternities, has to be one of the most respected, yet most feared, officials among the 2,000 fraternity brothers on campus.

An anonymous phone call to his 24-hour hotline, which played a key role in cracking two major hazing incidents this past spring, can make or break a

Sigma Phi Epsilon received a five-year suspension from the campus when an underage pledge almost died from guzzling nearly a fifth of whiskey. Kappa Alpha Psi was also suspended after an investigator from its national headquarters discovered that a pledge needed surgery from severely inflamed buttocks resulting from a paddling incident.

The hotline, which is nothing more than a phoneline to Binder at his Greek Life office and to his home in the evenings, has caught the attention of other university officials throughout the country who want to use it as a

"I know Auburn has one, and Florida, Florida State and Indiana University are seriously thinking about it," Binder said.

Binder doesn't mind being roused from a sound sleep by worried brothers, parents and girlfriends, he said. His wife is not thrilled about the phone calls, he says, but for him, it's all part of the job. If he can interrupt a hazing incident, or any other kind of misconduct, he doesn't mind the lack of sleep.

The success of the Hazing Hotline — he's received as many as 10 calls in one pledge period — is because Binder promises anonymity to callers, he said. He investigates as many as six incidents a month.

"We tell them we don't need names. We ask, 'what is the behavior? and give us the chapter name.' We try to make it as easy as possible," Binder said, noting that unless information is corroborated, it can be a struggle for the university to take measures to intervene.

"I really got the idea from my mother," said Binder. "She had a friend whose son was joining a fraternity elsewhere in the country, and he called my mom about some things he was worried about. She advised him to call the dean's office at his school. But they told him that he had to identify himself."

Binder said that very few of the hotline calls are bogus; however, some callers don't take the time to stay on the phone and give him enough information to follow up with the fraternity.

The calls that Binder receives usually come in after an incident. However, Binder has received calls about incidents about to happen, and that's when he makes an appearance at the fraternity house.

"We try to make certain the

complaint is credible. Then we document the phone call before we say anything to the fraternity," he said.

Mark Scobee, president of Pi Kappa Alpha fraternity, called Binder's hotline a "doubleedged sword," and though most fraternity men on the campus support it, it can leave fraternities vulnerable to false charges.

"It has really helped to stop hazing at the university, but you can get phony calls," Scobee said. "They don't ask your name, you know. But I think Ron has a good feel for what he should believe and what he shouldn't."

Scobee said fraternity presidents at the university are strongly opposed to hazing, and "it has been heading that way for a while.'

The Hazing Hotline telephone number is widely published throughout the university. It is sent to residential assistants, faculty, and is even distributed to residential homes and businesses that are situated within a block of a University of Georgia fraternity house. Information is

"It lets people know there is a policy," Binder said.

Binder noted that there has been an evolution in people's thinking about hazing, and that only a few years ago what was considered tolerable behavior, including cruel or destructive acts, is now known as hazing and has become increasingly less acceptable among fratemity members.

"Now doing all this stuff does not guarantee that we will get rid of hazing. It does increase the odds, however, of reducing the number of incidents and the severity of incidents," Binder said.

A hazing hotline only works as a supplement to a strong educational program, he said, and a very clear hazing policy. He cited the university's policy of banning 14 specific behaviors that are spelled out to "take the guesswork out of hazing."

Fraternity members on the Georgia campus must attend alcohol abuse, date rape and liability seminars every year and fraternity presidents have to sign hazing contracts that hold the organization accountable for almost all misconduct within the fraternity house.

"There are two kinds of hazing: It's either on the organizational level where a chapter has a traditional activity that's against the policy, and then there are individuals," Binder said. "These are the ones who try to mold the pledges.

"I tell presidents: 'Make a list of the top 10 that don't pay their dues, don't show up for formal events, don't go to rush, don't keep up their grades. These are the 10 who probably are hazing, and the chapters can do without these people."

Binder said the hotline could have legal ramifications if it is not handled very carefully. Individuals could hold the university responsible if they prove they reported behavior that resulted in injury or harm to someone and nothing was done about it.

"Some people are hiding behind their fraternity, and unfortunately, the officers have to be accountable for these jerks. The presidents are great. They take a stand and say, 'Look, we will not put up with any of this crap,' and these guys say, 'I'll do it anyway. I just won't tell anyone," Binder said.

#### **Defaults drop**

Tightened enforcement at the federal level reduced student loan default rates from 1990 to 1991, U.S. Secretary of Education Richard W. Riley reported this summer.

The national default rate declined from 22.4 percent in fiscal year 1990 to 17.5 percent in 1991. In 1991, the number of students from all types of post-secondary schools who defaulted on loans was 403,781, down from 551,208 in 1990.

The Department of Education estimated that defaulted student loans will cost taxpayers \$2.5 billion this year, down more than \$1 billion from 1991.



For years, President Breslin fought to keep condoms off the campus. Now, you can find condoms in several places at Drexel, like the men's locker room and the men's room in Creese.

Twice since 1990, The Triangle has distributed condoms in a special pull-out section designed to raise awareness and educate students about sexually transmitted diseases. The embers are still burning from a heated fight about whether or not to make condoms available in Philadelphia public schools.

The issue is fairly simple. Young people are going to have sex if they want to; that is the reality. Society has the means to curb the spread of STDs. There are two solutions to the problem. The proactive solution requires parents to instill values and morals in the children by good example from day one. But when this solution has failed, it's time to react. Making condoms available to young people at least shows them that others care about them, even if they don't care about themselves. This is the most important lesson, one Drexel would do well to show it has learned.

### Progress improvement good, yet limited, addition to Drexel

Editor:

I am writing in response to Michael Lebiedzinski's article of August 13, 1993, about Continuous Quality Improvement (CQI) at the University. The article stated that the quality improvement process originated in Japan following World War II. However, to my knowledge, this is an inaccurate statement.

In fact, this "quality movement" originated in the United States, through the research of Dr. Edward Demming. He was unable to find interest in quality improvement processes in the post-World War II U.S., where industry was unconcerned with these issues in a rush to meet an amazing surplus of demand for U.S.-produced goods, so he took his ideas to Japan.

His ideas were introduced during the reconstruction and refocusing of Japan's industrial base, which is one reason the quality improvement process

became such a fundamental part of the culture of Japanese industry.

As a member of student government, I heard a presentation sort of "systems thinking" at by the "Wild Bills" (billing improvement team) on their activities and recommendations to the administration and was very impressed. It is very encouraging to see quality improvement finally beginning to permeate the University and to see that it, and the entirety of the academy, is finally beginning to focus on the student as the ultimate customer.

I am certain that process improvement can yield great improvements in the efficiency of the University and can improve its ability to meet the needs of the students.

However, there will come a time when the returns generated through process improvement will diminish. Some organizations then practice process improvement for the sake of

process improvement, losing sight of the customer. It is my hope that the University will avoid this by engaging in some that point in time.


This would necessitate reexamining the overall way in which the University educates, meaning that it would consider huge aggregations of processes that could radically alter the manner in which education takes place at the University. I can certainly imagine the University, at that point, capitalizing on the technological and applications-oriented nature of the institution, perhaps leading a major shift to a new paradigm of education.

I sincerely hope that the University can keep up the good work because there is so much more that has yet to be done and so much more that can be achieved.
